



Label me!

If you are going to show, share, or sell your extra tubers you need to keep track of each dahlia variety.

Make sure your new Dahlia tubers are all clearly labelled. A Sharpie will work. I prefer to label tubers with Indelible Ink Pencil. Most of the time the pencil label will still be readable when you dig them up in the Fall.

Swan Island Dahlias:

One way to label your Dahlia plant when you start in pots, is to write the Dahlia name on painter's tape with a Sharpie.

I prefer Frog Tape brand because it comes in a light green which is easier to read the Sharpie markings.



Plastic labels work well to label your Dahlias after planting. Sharpie makes an oil based paint pen that holds up really well to sun and weather.

Hang labels on stakes, cages, or fence for easy identification during the growing season.
When it is time to cut down your plants at the end of the season, move the label to bottom of the dahlia stalk.



Label stays with tuber clump as you dig, wash, and dry before dividing for winter storage.



I divide my tubers in the Fall. I mark each tuber with the Indelible Ink Pencil. I store like tubers in a perforated zip lock bag. I put hang tag labels in the storage bag with the tubers.
